Description	<p>Management is one of the most influential inventions of 20th century capitalism. Managers best use an evidence-based approach to assess which advice is useful for them and their organizations. Similarly, you as a student should never forget to take a critical reflective stance towards all information provided.</p> <p>The course Managers@Work aims to provide an opportunity to explore the work of managers. The course invites you to take a critical stance towards management and its impact on society. Think about such pertinent questions like: "What does management look like? How do managers actually behave and perform, and why so? Which challenges do managers face during their careers? What impact do managers have on society? Are managers behaving responsibly?
